STATE SHORT COURSE CHAMPIONSHIPS 21 and 22 October 2006

The 2006 Short Course Championships were held at the new Peninsular Leisure Centre at Woy Woy and it was a fantastic weekend. Those of us who remember the old pool at Woy Woy were surprised by the spaciousness of the new centre

which is extremely well suited to a Masters Championship. A fast pool, the other half of the pool for warm up and swim down, plenty of seating, a nice grassed area outside (if it were sunny!!), a room for the officials, a great dry recording area, fresh healthy food and extremely obliging staff. I would have to say it is one of the best pools I have worked with and I must thank the management and staff of the centre as well as *Gordon Ferguson* and the *Ettalong Pelicans* for their hospitality.

The entire Meet ran like clockwork, thanks to our amazing

group of officials who once again worked tirelessly all weekend. As we did not have our usual volunteers, timekeeping was a small issue, as there are still many swimmers who feel they are above timekeeping (and there is no excuse about not being able to see the watch as we were using little red buttons). This was the first Short Course Championships where we have used automatic timing and it was appreciated by everyone.

Day 1 produced some outstanding swims, the most exciting being the World Record swim by *Lynette Stevenson* (NBT) in the 50m freestyle, where she knocked 0.45 seconds off the existing World record to now hold the 50m freestyle record in both Long and Short Course in the 60-64 year age group. Lynette then competed in the next event, the 100m IM, and broke the National record for this event by just under 1 second, another amazing swim. There were many other records broken on the first day, those swimmers achieving two records on the day included *Andrew Dorrington*, two State records (100 fly and 50 free), *Paul Wyatt* set two National records (100 fly and 200 Breast), *John Stacpoole* (50 free

and 100 IM) State and National, *Pam Hutchings*, two National records (100 back and 50 free), *Sue Perkins* (200 free and 100IM) State and National, *Alan Brown* (50 free and 100 IM) two national records, *Alan Godfrey* (100 IM and 200 IM) two State records, *Marilyn Earp* (100 back and 100 fly), a State and a National, and *Bob Barry* (200 free and 100 back) with two National records. All records broken are listed in the records section of this edition.

Day 2 was to prove as exciting as day 1 with once again many records being broken. Lynette was again in great form and added the 50m Backstroke world record to her list of achievements for 2006, taking 0.11 sec off the old World mark. Later in the day she broke the 50m Fly State record as well. Another double was achieved by Paul Wyatt (200 fly and 100 breast) with two state records and Pam Hutchings smashed 3 National records (50 back, 100 free and 200 back). There were also some very exciting relay swims which resulted in 5 National and 1 State record over the course of the weekend.

The number of competitors were up for a State Championship held out of Sydney, and it was great to see so many new faces at a State Meet. The rivalry between all clubs was fierce and it is great to see the club spirit, particularly in the relays.

We appreciate the sponsorship by the national sponsor, Vorgee, who gave us two beautiful raffle prizes and a prize for the new award the Male and Female swimmer of the Meet. The inaugural female swimmer of the Meet was *Lynette Stevenson*, very closely followed by *Pam Hutchings* and the first Male swimmer of the Meet was *Bob Barry* followed closely by *Paul Wyatt*. Congratulations to all four.

The Division 1 State Champions were Seaside Pirates, who were very closely followed by Manly Masters. Division 2 was won by a newly rejuvenated Ettalong Pelicans club, Division 3 was won by Blue Mountains Phoenix and Division 4 by Wyong Wobbygongs. The Des McCormick trophy for the highest average points was awarded to Seaside Pirates. The Harry Fowler trophy for the relay team 200 plus breaking a record by the highest margin was won by the Manly 280 plus medley relay team breaking the previous record by over 10 seconds, and the Gordon Cozins trophy for the highest points

in relays was won by Seaside Pirates.

A huge weekend made possible by many people who work tirelessly to run a State Championship and I would like to thank each and everyone of them. JOE VASSALLO ~ 1929-2006

Trinity AUSSI Masters is sad to report the passing of *Joe Vassallo* on October 12 this year after a 22 month battle with Melanoma cancer.

Joe was born in Malta in September 1929 where he spent his early life in and around the ocean.

He arrived in Sydney in 1950 as a young, energetic 21 year old and lived in Petersham with the Delerane family who sponsored his emigration to Australia.

He was later joined by his brothers, sisters and mother and they lived together in Redfern until he met Judith in 1956.

They married in 1960 and eventually settled in Ashfield to raise their three children, Christopher, Stephen and Carrie.

He spent much of his working life as a communications officer for Overseas Tele Communications.

Joe was a keen sportsman, always swimming, but also playing water polo and soccer for the

Melitta Eagles soccer club. He enjoyed a good game of squash and coaching his son's soccer team.

As he raised his family he became more and more involved in competitive swimming spending many years swimming for the



Ashfield Catholic Club.

Joe spent the last 20 years as a member of Trinity AUSSI where he was President for a number of years. He thoroughly enjoyed not only the competitive environment of Masters Swimming but also loved the friendship of fellow

members.

He was a fun loving man who enjoyed a good joke and loved to break into spontaneous song when ever he felt the need. He was very passionate about the club and was always there to open the pool at Trinity Grammar every night and on Saturdays for the swimmers. He was an avid supporter of club events and Masters carnivals. His last duty was as a Marshal at the Trinity AUSSI carnival in June this year.

Joe was fondly farewelled by family and friends at his funeral where fellow AUSSI swimmer, *Bob Arrow*, gave a heartfelt and humorous eulogy dominated by stories of Joe's life as a swimmer.

A touching tribute to his love of swimming adorned his coffin where, along with his swimming cap, goggles and towel, lay a simple message "Gone Swimming".

Trinity AUSSI sends their condolences to Joe's family. He will be greatly missed. r

LAKE MACQUARIE CARNIVAL - 26 AUGUST 2006

Officials:

Our Club has barely qualified with the number of officials required to gain official carnival sanction - Marshal (Michael), a Check Starter (Don) and a Chief Timekeeper (Roger). Other officials came from near and far and did a grand job. Unpaid and busy, these people do their job carnival after carnival with surprisingly good humour. As a club, we should not lose sight of the fact that the club needs more qualified officials and we could reach the stage where we will not be able to have the carnival sanctioned. This is problem we will have to deal with.

Programme:

A different programme from last year was trialled with the 50s and 100s interspersed. It seemed to work well and it certainly did not adversely affect the number of entries with 158 being received, seven more than the previous high. However, once again we had the relays halfway through the programme and this meant having to chase entries early and then chase them again. On the positive side of having them early, it does get them out of the way and there is no anti-climax to deal with after the last race. It doesn't really affect us if visiting clubs do not enter relay teams - after all, it is in their best interest to enter for point score trophies.

Marshalling:

The marshalling all took place in the area behind the blocks and this area is partly exposed and the weather not as kind as it could have been. There were some complaints that it was too cold out there. However, we still believe that it was a better option than marshalling in the foyer.

Food:

Once again, the Joneses and their team did a magnificent job on the barbecue.

Many favourable comments were received about the barbecue.

Pool & Pool Staff:

The Pool Staff now employed by the Council were most helpful and it was a great help to be able to have their support in any number of ways. The pool was in good order and the pool water was much warmer than last year and a few favourable comments regarding the pool in general were received.

day with 12 great prizes courtesy of various generous sponsors and individual member donations. The piece de resistance, however, was the after carnival tucker organised by gourmet food connoisseur, *Bobby Kalaf*. All agreed that the hamburgers with the works were at least equal to the high standard set by Lake Macquarie Crocs and the souvlaki (kebabs) were an extra touch. 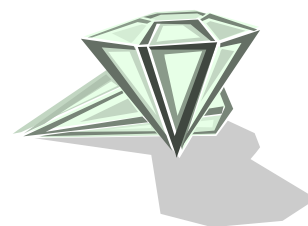
We would like to give everyone the chance to win the gems so the following shows how.

- The entrants who will be invited to compete in this race will be a swimmer from each ten-year age group from 20-29 up to 80-89 years, plus one other. These would be invited from the swimmers who swim the 100m freestyle events in the three

carnivals leading up to the Long Course Championships, which are Campbelltown, Manly and Blacktown. The invitees will be women in each age group who swam closest to their nominated times over these three carnivals, plus one other who was second closest in her age group.

We hope that the competition will be fierce for these lovely gems, and look forward to some great racing. Our sincere thanks to Jack and June for being so generous in donating the gems and we wish everyone luck in the quest for these jewels. r



HILLS AUSSI MASTERS 30TH REUNION

As *Gary Stutsel*, one of our founding members can attest, the Australian Union of Senior Swimmers (AUSSI) started in Sydney in 1975 with all swimmers being members of the organisation. This quickly became unwieldy as numbers grew rapidly and it was decided to divide into clubs so the Secretary was the contact for correspondence.

As Hills AUSSI Masters is one of the oldest clubs in Australia, starting around September 1976 at Sun Valley Pool at West Pennant Hills and moving to Galston Community Pool when it was completed in 1977, we celebrated our 30th anniversary on the 30th September. Approximately 37 members and ex-members attended at the Galston Club where we enjoyed a feast of food, drinks and memories.

An amazing array of member's photos adorned the stage and we pored over them and the memorabilia of track suits, t-shirts, polo shirts and costumes, including the famous Mickey ones – white see-through-when-wet. Fortunately, in those days, we had the figure to wear them – except the boys looked a bit strange in them. We even have some black and whites of those days at Sun Valley Pool (now bulldozed for housing).

One member came from Eden and we received many apologies from all over Australia – Perth, Adelaide, Sunshine Coast etc. We will try to keep the contacts open and invite these members to future occasions. Some ex-members have expressed an interest in rejoining and one already has.

Green and gold helium filled balloons and streamers filled the room and videos shown from way back and President, *Melita Sutton*,

talked of the Hills history.

In earlier years, Hills had some 70 plus members. It was a thriving, exciting club to be part of, with the full run of Galston pool, to the point where we had the keys to the premises and closed when we were ready to leave. Social activity was an intrinsic part of the club's success and, after training, the majority would gather at the end of the pool with tea, coffee and occasionally wine until we got tired and went home. Carnival attendance was exceptional and we were consistently in the top 10 of

the clubs attending swim meets, and many times we were in the top 5 and managed to actually win a few carnivals, not including our own carnival.

In talking about the club's history, one cannot go past one of AUSSI Master's legendary coaches. Under the guidance (or tyranny, as some would say) of our head coach, *Des McCormack*, we trained hard and often and because of Des' love of coaching, he knew how to bring out the very best in each of us. His passion for teaching and coaching far outweighed his mood swings. Des was also NSW coach and National coach, and we were indeed a fortunate club to have someone with Des' ability and enthusiasm as our head coach. Woe betide anyone, however, who dared to

muck about while he was coaching, with his strong Irish accent bellowing at you "do you want to be a champion or not?"

Des's tragic death in 1988 brought about a challenge in many of us to continue swimming at all. With the dedication of other coaches, *Pat Somerville* (who took over from Des as NSW coach), *Steve Twartz*, *Judith Markich*, *Di Coxon-Ellis* (who was also NSW coach from '94-'98) and *Anne Elsegood*, the club has continued to exist. The early 90's brought about a major change to the use of the pool when the pool fell under the management of Hornsby Council. We no longer had the keys to the premises, and we had to be out of the water by 9pm. This had a disastrous effect on the membership and our numbers dwindled significantly over the coming years. Bring back the tea and coffee!

As small as our club is, many of the members assist at NSW swim meets: *Mark Hepple* as the NSW Meet Recorder, with the assistance of his partner *Alison Woodward* and often *Melita*; *Di Coxon-Ellis* as NSW Administrator, filling many other roles such as Chief Timekeeper, *Col Ellis* as Starter and *Tony Howe* as Marshal.

The club has seen many members come and go, but there has been a consistent core of members who keep the club afloat including *Melita*, *Di* and *Col*, *Alison* and *Mark*, *Anne*, *Kim Chapman*, our dear *Hilda Lindfield*, *John Wendt*, *Tony Howe*, and the *Shearer family*.

To top off the occasion we cut the green and gold cake and raised our glasses of champagne to toast our club. May it continue to prosper, and always maintain the

FANTASTIC DAYS IN SAN FRANCISCO - AVERY AQUATIC CENTRE, STANFORD UNIVERSITY POST TOUR OF CALIFORNIA with INTERNATIONAL SPORTS TOURS

THE "WOW" FACTOR

Athletes from 75 countries converged on the Avery Aquatic centre on the campus of the famous Stanford University to take part in one of the largest aquatic events in the world.

The Avery Aquatic centre is one of the largest outdoor swim centres in the world with two competition 50 metre pools, 3 warm up/down pools and is acclaimed one of the finest and fastest – and it really felt fast!

There were 5491 swimmers representing more than 1161 teams throughout the world, including 3130 athletes from the USA, 324 from Japan, 74 from Australia.

There were 291 athletes who had previously competed at an Olympic Games, including Gary Hall (55yrs USA) and Gary Hall Jnr, who were the only father/son duet in Olympic history to make 3 Olympics each and both competed in these Championships (Gary Hall Jnr – Olympics 1996, 2000, 2004).

The championships included 3 training days, 7 pool competition days and the 3km open water swim on the last day.

Those of us who were lucky enough to travel with IST for the Championships and Post Tour enjoyed a complete stress free holiday for 3 weeks (except the swimming) and everything down to the last detail was well organised, with *Brian Travers* keeping us informed of any changes.

The IST AUSSI group of 40

swimmers was accommodated at The Maple Tree Inn in the famous Silicone Valley, approximately 20 minutes by Shuttle bus from Stanford University .

The location was a very safe area, within walking distance of a diverse range of eateries, cafes and shopping.

The staff at the Inn were very friendly and went out of their way to accommodate our needs, including daily "happy hour" sessions, free computer use to see heats and results etc. and baskets full of "bananas" and Yogurt tubs to take to the pool each day.



The day after arriving in San Francisco we toured the coast along the famous "17 Mile Drive" from Carmel to Monterey, also visiting the famous Hearst Castle (built by the father of Patty Hearst). The pool at this stunning medieval castle was inlaid with gold tiling. Oh for a quick dip!

The days were very hot, 30-40 degrees with little shade at the pool. Mobility on pool deck was difficult due to the sheer numbers and after day one there were a few burnt "S.S. Pirates" heading for the shade.

The organisation and event management was fantastic with officials spending many long hours on pool deck and the announcer giving a running commentary all

day of action in both pools – females in one 50m pool and males in the other.

Competition was friendly, relaxed and yet competitive, with everyone keen to enjoy themselves and swim PBs.

The Open Water Swim on the final day was held at Alameda Beach, in a cove off San Francisco Bay. It was a difficult and challenging 3km course in windy, choppy conditions in which 922 swimmers braved the fiercely cold conditions. There were approximately 20 Aussies and 3 from NSW.

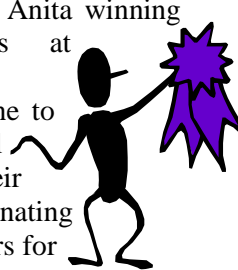
One of the highlights for many was the scenic flight over the Grand Canyon and the helicopter flight to see Vegas at night - WOW!

- First "Ryde Games Open Carnival" 1990 (initiated by the Ryde Council's Sports Foundation which promotes a healthy lifestyle in the community).
- First coach for RAMS 1991 - training nights commence instead of races. Six motivated coaches, over the ensuing 15 years whipped us into shape.
- Revised club clothing/cossies, 1991.
- 10 year's RAMS anniversary celebrated with dinner at Ryde Eastwood Leagues Club in 1991 and 15 years anniversary at Ryde RSL Community Club.
- Council permits use of pool at later time of 8:00-9:00pm Wednesday nights, 1992.
- New style clothing (navy blue polo shirt replaces pink T shirt), 1996.
- Last carnival in indoor 25m pool before complex closes for redevelopment for the Olympics waterpolo venue in 1998. Largest carnival for us with 290 entries.

- Next few years, club meets at various pools for training and RAMS carnivals held at Epping Pool in 1999 and 2000.
- RAMS wins gold medal and \$1000 in NSW Sports Safety Award Scheme.
- New Ryde Centre opens in 2000 and club recommences its two training nights at the new indoor 50m pool.
- 26 RAMS attend inaugural State Relay Meet 2004.
- New Club Constitution adopted in 2005.
- Members participated in various fund raising/promotional activities such as Cancer Research, Brittle Bones, Royal Institute for Deaf & Blind Children over the years.
- Current membership around 70. Membership has varied from initial 10 or so, to 30 in early 1990s to a high of 92 in 1992.

Val Lincoln's motto is "use it or lose it". Val is a life member of the Gosford club and at 82 years of age swims 1.5 kilometres every day.

Val's love of swimming began when she was seven and she joined the Bondi Ladies at age 14. These days Val wears prescription goggles, and has to remove her hearing aids before getting into the water, but her love of swimming hasn't waned at all.

"Swimming is great", she says, "I just like getting into the water and swimming up and down. I think of all sorts of things as I'm going along, but when I'm leading up to a competition I'm mostly counting strokes. I don't get tired, I just keep going."

Earlier this year she won the over 60's category in a 2km swim event at Terrigal beating women 20 years younger than her.

Val has done very well in her age groups at both State Championships this year, and her efforts earned her a grant from



the Central Coast Regional Organisation of Councils to help her attend the World Championships at Stanford

University in August.

At Stanford Val was 3rd in the 800m freestyle, 6th in the 200m backstroke, 4th in the 200m freestyle, and 4th in the 400m open water swim.

Val is well known at Mingara Pool, Gosford Pool and Toowoong Bay Baths.

She insists persistence is the key to keeping fit in the senior years. "I've never given up. I just keep swimming. I think if you just keep doing something you don't lose it. If I've still got my marbles I plan on doing this when I'm 100", says Val.

Everyone in Masters swimming is proud of Val's achievements and I'm sure we

all can take some lessons from a great lady. r

THE 2006 MAUI CHANNEL SWIM

The Maui Channel Swim (Lanai to Maui) is an annual 10 mile race held on the first Saturday in September that can be swum either solo or as a 6 person relay team.

Tattersalls Masters Swimming traditionally sends a relay team every second year.

Dr David Pullen

Dr David Pullen passed away in October. Our condolences to his sons.

David joined AUSSI Masters in 1990 and had not swum competitively since the age of 17 when he was a member of a State Championship relay team at school. David's first AUSSI carnival was at North Sydney eight weeks after joining his first AUSSI swimming club Trinity.

David's major contribution to AUSSI was as a Medical officer. He started in this position in his first year of joining Masters swimming, and the first carnival he officiated at was a Trinity Meet. He contributed much to AUSSI during this time, officiating at many club Meets and State and National Championships, he was always visible around the pool in his bright pink t-shirt. David built up a team of medical officers who would alternate between carnivals. He was awarded the Sport Medicine award in 1996 for his contributions to Masters Swimming.

David was President of the Trinity club for one year, and assisted his wife with the positions of Race secretary and registrar.

While at the Ryde club he acted as Newsletter editor for a period of 2 years.

David was an anesthetist at Poplars Hospital for 30 years, a member of the Ryde Hospital Board and Poplars Hospital Boards for many years, President of the AMA for 2 years and set up the Doctors Health Group and Medical Defence Union.

He was also awarded the Betty Grant award for his contributions to AUSSI Masters Swimming in NSW. r

Beryl Grace was a member of Masters Swimming NSW for over 25 years. She joined Masters Swimming soon after its formation in 1975. The first time her name was listed in the Top 10 is 1976.

Beryl joined shortly after she learnt to swim in her mid-50s. She took up swimming to combat arthritis. She was living in Narooma on the NSW South Coast and learnt to swim at the Narooma Pool, which was managed by her brother, Alan Dufty, who has also been a member of Masters Swimming for a number of years. (Alan currently swims with Seaside Pirates.) The first club that Beryl joined was Narooma AUSSI.

For a person who started swimming later in life, Beryl's achievements were outstanding. She set numerous records at World, National and Branch level. Her first National record was 1500m Freestyle in the 55-59 year age group in 1978. She went on to set National records over four age groups in Freestyle, Individual Medley and Butterfly. Her World Record was in 1986 in the 800m Freestyle in the 60-64 year age group.

In the 1980s when the Narooma club closed, Beryl transferred her membership firstly to Lane Cove Masters and then Ryde. She travelled from the South Coast each weekend to compete in carnivals.

Beryl will always be remembered for her love of swimming and competing in AUSSI Masters Meets. She travelled to many meets in Australia and overseas – including Tokyo in 1986, Rio de Janeiro in 1990 (when I travelled with her), and Montreal.

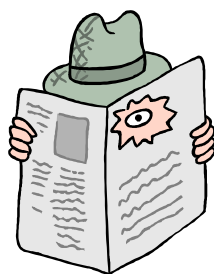
No obstacle ever stopped Beryl from swimming or competing for too long. Not only did she overcome the threat of arthritis, but she also returned to the pool after a

horrific car accident in 1988, when it was thought she would not walk again. Once again, she went on to set more National and Branch records.

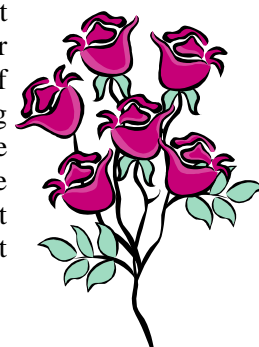
In the mid-1990s Beryl transferred her membership to the newly formed Shoalhaven club at Nowra, as she was now living in this area.

Relocation of Sports House

Registration database

With almost two years of using SwimNet, the ASI on-line registration database, there are still a few glitches to be ironed out with transfers and reports but otherwise it is a useful tool and only a few NSW clubs are yet to go online. Club Registrars have been supplied with training for the database on an ongoing basis. These instructions can be accessed on the NSW website.

If Club Registrars change or go away for a period, please notify the State Office to put the new Registrar's details on the database. Do NOT pass on passwords to another registrar.

Renewals for 2007

There are only a couple of forms to fill out to reregister for next year. The first one can be accessed from the database - the AUSSI National form - where you can verify your contact details and tick to receive the newsletters electronically. Secondly, your club may ask you to fill out the NSW Medical information form. The fee for 2007 is \$57.50 plus your club fee.

Club Registrars will be able to commence on-line renewals for 2007 on December 15. Renew now and they will be able to register you before Xmas and have their break too. Keep in mind you won't be

able to swim at January carnivals, or at your club, after January 1, 2007 if you are not a financial member.

Deadlines:

- **Club safety and Annual Reports:** Reports need to be sent to the State Office by the end of December so, if you are the key person in your club responsible for writing your reports, please complete and send in as soon as possible.

- **Affiliation Form:** Clubs need to re-affiliate with Masters Swimming NSW by December 31, 2006. There are carnivals to be held early in the year so your swimmers may not be able to compete unless the club is a financial affiliate of the State body.

- **Ian McPhail Official of the Year Award and the Coach of the Year Award:** Nominations for these awards are also both due end of December. The winners of these two trophies will be presented at the State Championships in 2007 and nominated for the National equivalent of these awards.

NSW Championships

Meet Directors, *Jane Noake* and *Bob Dorrington*, organised a great event held at Peninsula Leisure Centre, Woy Woy. 361 swimmers enjoyed the competition. Thanks to Blue Mountains and Cronulla Sutherland for manning the raffle table over the two days. Thanks to the clubs who provided raffle prizes and to Vorgee for supplying raffle prizes, prizes for the Male and Female Swimmer of the Meet and

also a swimcap for each competitor. The Long Distance Long Course Championships at Blacktown Aquatic Centre attracted a record 134 swimmers.

Government Grants

Funding for 2006/2007 has been received from the Department of Sport & Recreation, whose support is greatly appreciated. This grant has been reduced and will reduce further over the next few years .

Volunteers

Thanks to *Malcolm Heath* for his administrative assistance in the State Office and to *Jan Cameron-Smith* as Secretary of the Bush Rangers club. RULE CHANGES FOR 2007

Changes have been made to the structure of our Rules for 2007. Firstly the Rules have been split into two sections:

General Rules which cover the organisation of swim meets and lists of events (old SW 1 to SW 8) plus the National Top 10 and National Swim (old SW 20 and SW 21) plus the former By-Laws that dealt with Sanctions, Facilities, Awards, Aerobic Swims and the National Swim (formerly BL 11,12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17): and

Swimming Rules have been renumbered from SW 1 to SW 15M and the numbers match those in the FINA and Swimming Australia rules for the first time. Most of the changes do not effect swimmers but Referees and other Officials will have to read them carefully. Referees and Starters are having a workshop before the first 2007 swim meet so they will be aware of the changes and the new numbers.

Swimmers need to know:

- # Backstroke SW 6.4 Gliding and kicking that are part of a continuous turning action are allowed. Independent gliding or kicking actions are not allowed.
- # Breaststroke SW 7.4 Swimmers whose feet break the surface of the water when doing a legal underwater dolphin kick will not be disqualified.
- # Butterfly SW 8.2 and SW 8.3M see answer to letter from *Phil Baird* at the end of this page.
- # Relays SW 10.10 Second, third or fourth swimmers who start early can no longer return to the wall and start again.
- # Timekeepers SW 2.8 and SW 2.9 There is no longer provision for Chief Lane Timekeepers. Lane Timekeepers must decide who will perform the various duties.

Meet Directors will need to read the **General Rules** if planning to swim two people in one lane.

The Medical Disability Rules are now listed at SW 15M.

"Butterglide"!!! Give it a go.

With one of the topics of conversation around pool deck being alterations to the rules governing the Butterfly stroke, I thought it appropriate to add my views on the subject.

Ever since I became a member of Masters, I have found that a vast number of swimmers believed that butterfly was the most difficult stroke and therefore was avoided by a great number of competitors at carnivals.

Since the rules were relaxed and "butterglide" permitted, quite a few have decided to try the stroke and add it to their repertoire of swims. With this in mind, I would like to suggest to those who make the rules, that it is far better to encourage swimmers to take up the modified form of butterfly as an additional discipline, than to make the stroke more difficult for them to manage.

So why not adopt a more positive action and encourage all coaches to teach would be butterflyers how to "butterglide". These people will find that the more "buttergliding" they attempt, the more proficient and confident they will become with the orthodox butterfly stroke.

As I speak from experience, I can guarantee this approach will work, so coaches, why not try it and see if the number of butterfly swimmers increase.

Response from Gary Stutsel, NSW Technical Director:

Phil's letter is very thought provoking, as there are two parts to what he has to say. One is what we do in sanctioned swim meets and the other what we do in training and at club swims.

I wholeheartedly support Phil's ideas on the use of "butterglide" to

introduce older swimmers, who have never learnt to butterfly, to the stroke. Contrary to Phil's suggestion "butterglide" is a fairly recent innovation following relaxation of the rules, the situation is the opposite. I learnt to swim with up to 8 breaststroke kicks per stroke back in the early 80s after watching the late Josie Sansom of South Australia doing it at the 1983 Pan Pacific Championships.

I learnt "butterglide" so I could swim the 400m and 800m Aerobic swims. Contrary to the belief of some, Aerobic swims do not have to be refereed (except at meets), so I see no reason why "butterglide" can not still be used in them. Now for meets.

Rather than being relaxed, the rules were toughened up in 2005 when the word "continuously" came into what is now SW 8.2.

"Both arms must be brought forward together over the water and brought backward, simultaneously and continuously throughout the race, subject to SW 8.5."

This change caused a lot of angst amongst the Branch Technical Directors in 2006 and after lengthy discussion led to the introduction in October 2006 (effective January 2007) of rule

"SW 8.3M... A breaststroke kicking movement is permitted, provided the swimmer does no more than two kicks per arm stroke. During the second kick there must be no sculling of the hands. If a scull is commenced the arm stroke must be completed."

Clarification: *Either a dolphin or breaststroke leg action may be used with the butterfly arm action. A mixture of these leg actions may be used during the performance of butterfly."*

The new rule will require swimmers to do no more than two breaststroke kicks per stroke, unless they are eligible for a Medical Disability (MD) certificate based on a shoulder injury. r

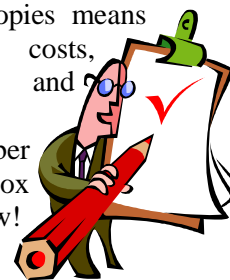

We will let you know by email as soon as Splash is on the website so that you can look at it (and download and print it if you like)

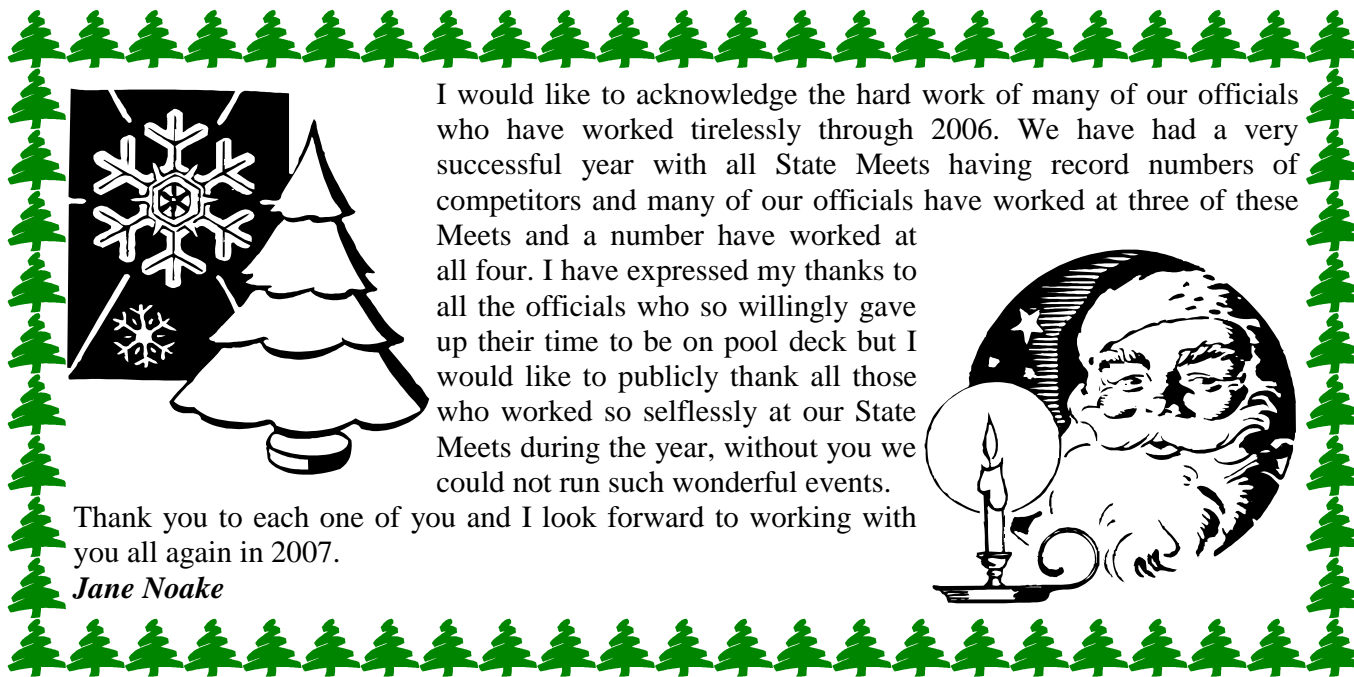
