August Trivia answer

The story of Resusci Annie begins more than a century ago, when the dead body of a girl who looked about 16 was pulled from the Seine, the authors wrote. Because her body showed no signs of violence, some people speculated that she had drowned herself intentionally. The body was put on public display in a mortuary in hopes that someone could identify the deceased — a common practice at the time — but nobody identified the teen. She became known as "L'Inconnue de la Seine (the Unknown Woman of the Seine)."

Though anonymous, she was by no means forgotten. The pathologist who performed her autopsy was so taken with her serene expression that he had a model maker create a plaster "death mask" of her face. The mask was replicated and sold. In fact, the Lorenzi model makers, who, according to the paper authors made the original death mask, still sell copies of it today under the title "Noyée [Drowned Woman] de la Seine."

In the late 1950s, when medical students were just starting to learn and practice CPR, Archer Gordon, a member of the American Heart Association's CPR Committee, realized that a CPR dummy could save medical students from the unnecessary pain and potential rib damage of practicing CPR on each other. To manufacture such a thing, he and a Norwegian colleague sought the help of Norwegian toymaker Åsmund Laerdal.

Call for nominations for coach of the year

MSNSW is seeking nominations for the 2023 Coach of the Year award. Is there a coach in your club who has been a motivating and inspiring influence? Nominations close 12th of January 2024

Coaches at all levels within Masters Swimming are eligible. Coach of the Year may be a high-profile coach with elite competition level squads and high-performance swimmers. Other equally committed and skilled coaches make very significant contributions/applications in different ways to masters swimming.

The selection panel makes their decision based on the overall merits of the individual nominees. To be eligible for consideration the nominee should:

- be a current Masters Swimming Australia Member and have been a member from 01 January;
- hold a current Masters Swimming Australia Coaching Accreditation or equivalent •
- have been actively coaching Masters swimmers (detail position in club and coaching hours/week);
- have made an outstanding contribution in coaching and/or towards the development of coaching and promotion of Masters Swimming at Club, Branch and/or National level;
- have undertaken professional development opportunities to improve their coaching skills and/or presented at coaching courses, workshops or clinics;
- have demonstrated a proven capacity to improve the level of performance of Masters Swimmers (i.e. improvement in times, placings at Branch/National and/or International events, technique development, ability for swimmers to complete a greater distance and/or achievement of a higher level of fitness);
- have practiced and espoused a philosophy of fair play and promoted the values of Masters Swimming e.g. acceptance, consideration & respect for all participants; Coaches who have implemented innovative ideas to improve coaching and/or undertaken extra-curricular activities relevant to coaching above the minimum level expected of a Masters Swimming Coach will be viewed favorably.

Call for nominations for technical official of the year

MSNSW is seeking nominations for the 2023 Official of the Year award.

To be eligible for consideration, nominees must be an accredited Masters Swimming Technical Official, be a current member from 01 January and must have made an outstanding contribution in officiating and/or towards the development of officiating at Club, Branch and/or National level.

For example:

- Attended courses to enhance knowledge and interpretation of rules;
- Delivered courses to prospective officials;
- Taken the position of mentor to trainee officials.

The Official of the Year should be an individual who has achieved excellence as a technical official. Implementation of innovative ideas to improve officiating and extra activities related to officiating, such as leadership, accreditation and professionalism will also be considered. Nominations must be received by the Branch Office no later than 12th of January to be eligible for consideration.

Words of Wisdom from your Whistleblowers

I wrote the article below when we returned to competition post Covid. Things were going well with only 5 disqualifications at State Short Course Championships. Then, at the recent Manly carnival everything changed! I myself filled out 5 DQ cards during one 50m event!! Referees & IOTs were left wondering what was happening! Was it the weather ? Were swimmers suffering temporary memory loss? Neither of these! What we discovered was that Masters Swimming is continuing to grow and for a large number of swimmers this was their first carnival. Unfortunately for several new members their first swim has resulted in disqualification! This is something that we want to avoid at all costs. It takes the FUN out of Masters Swimming!

What can we do to make sure this doesn't keep happening?

- Have you got new members in your club? If they are attending a carnival please talk to them & check with them that they know the relevant rules for the stroke they are swimming and the procedures in place for check starting. Also what the whistles mean! If you're unsure, refer them on to an official.
- Swimmers new to competition or returning to competition after a break please don't be afraid to approach one of the referees and check with them that you won't be doing anything to disqualify yourself. We would prefer to give you advice before your race rather than have to fill out a DQ card at the end.

Just a short reminder on what the whistles mean.

The Start

The starter will announce your race, do not get on the blocks until the referee blows

One long whistle – In Freestyle, Breaststroke, Butterfly and Individual Medley races, this is the signal for swimmers to take their positions with at least one foot at the front of the starting platform or end of the pool (alongside the blocks), or in the water with one hand having contact with the starting wall.

2nd long whistle (In Backstroke and Medley Relay races only) - swimmers shall without undue delay take up their starting position.

The Finish

2 short whistle blasts - exit the water from the side of the pool.

NB Note that when 'starting over the top' is used at an event the Referee will not give a whistle signal for the swimmers to leave the water. The swimmers must leave the pool as soon as the next heat has started.

Warm Up

- At all swim meets supervised warm up facilities are available before and during the event.
- During some meets this may be one lane only. If that is the case swimming butterfly and backstroke is not allowed for safety reasons. No training aids are permitted.
- Warm up lanes have signs designating the stroke to be swum in that lane. We ask that you comply with signage and be mindful of the fact that you are sharing the lane with swimmers of all abilities.

For safety reasons watches are not allowed to be worn.
